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Naples Overview

Paradise Coast

Located on the emerald Gulf of Mexico in southwest Florida, the resort town of Naples is known for its casually sophisticated atmosphere. Home to the elegant Inn on Fifth, Naples and the beautiful surrounding area is known as Florida's Paradise Coast. Visitors experience challenging championship golf courses, miles of pristine beaches, the wilds of The Everglades, world-class museums and art galleries, performing arts, unique shopping, delectable dining and pristine nature preserves and parks.

Air Travel Access

Southwest Florida International Airport (RSW)

Southwest Florida International Airport is located in Fort Myers, just 40 minutes north of Naples. The airport supports Lee, Collier, Charlotte, Hendry and Glades counties, and is serviced by most major domestic carriers and several international carriers. RSW offers nonstop flights to more than 40 cities, including Chicago, Atlanta, New York, and Boston. The airport offers visitors extensive ground transportation options, including rental car, commercial taxis, and shuttles.

Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport (FLL)

Another easily-accessible and cost-effective flight option to Naples is Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport. The airport is less than two hours from Naples and offers direct flights from 65 U.S. and 36 international cities. Most major rental car companies are represented at the airport.

Naples Municipal Airport

Located just 10 minutes from The Inn on Fifth, the Naples Municipal airport is a major private jet and charter facility. In July 2011, *Professional Pilot* named Naples Municipal Airport the 25th best fixed-base operator (FBO) and the 12th best independent FBO in the U.S. The airport offers a U.S. Customs service, a sunlit passenger lounge, a business center, fitness facility, pilots' lounge, weather-data station and complimentary Wi-Fi. Car rental, shuttle, and taxi transfers are also available. Scenic bi-plane rides are available from Naples Air.

Area Attractions

Naturally Naples – Naples' star attraction – the **beaches** – have been rated among the top ten in the U.S. by consumers at the Yahoo! Travel Web site, according to a poll conducted by *National Geographic Traveler* magazine. The Travel Channel named Naples the "Best All-Around Beach" in 2005. Most recently, TripAdvisor® announced Naples Beach as the #13 top beach in the U.S. Within easy walking distance of the Inn on Fifth, the immaculate white sand beaches and emerald waters of the Gulf of Mexico are a "must see" while visiting the Paradise Coast.

Visitors can take a walk on the wild side at **Naples Zoo at Caribbean Gardens**. Southwest Florida's only nationally accredited zoo, the 52-acre zoo and historic botanical gardens feature tropical ambiance, exciting wildlife shows, and hundreds of animals, from tigers to African Wild Dogs to antelope. In 2011, the zoo welcomed an exhibit allowing guests to hand feed giraffes. Additionally, the Naples Zoo at Caribbean Gardens is now one of only four American zoos and the only zoo in the Southeast U.S. where visitors can see an African honey badger. Guests can browse the many walking trails or cruise through a lake populated by islands that provide cage-free homes to primates including lemurs, apes and monkeys.

Attractions (cont'd) **The Conservancy of Southwest Florida's Naples Nature Center** is just down the road from Naples Zoo at Caribbean Gardens, with various educational exhibits allowing adventurous visitors to touch a snake, count an alligator's teeth, and explore Southwest Florida's natural side with a narrated boat tour. The 14-acre conservancy has been closed for over a year and re-opens in 2012 providing Naples with a world class facility for paddling, as well as animal rescue and rehabilitation. The conservancy offers narrated boat rides, trails, and, for the truly adventurous, canoe and kayak rentals to explore the natural waterways of the Gordon River. Narrated cruises and sunset cruises on the Cocohatchee River through a pristine mangrove estuary, home to a variety of bird species, are offered through the **Cocohatchee Nature Center**. Cruise passengers often spot marine life, such as manatees and dolphins, during their voyage. The 166-acre **Delnor-Wiggins Pass State Park** features beaches lined with sea oats and cabbage palms, along with wooded trails. The park, known for its mile-long, unspoiled, natural beach, also offers picnic facilities, an observation tower, and summer educational sea turtle programs.

Cruise the streets of Naples in the warm Florida sun and cool gulf breeze on a Segway. **Segway of Naples** at the Experience Naples visitor center offers guided Segway tours through downtown Naples.

History and train buffs alike enjoy the **Naples Depot & Lionel Museum Train Display**, located in Naples' first passenger train station. Collier County's newest historical museum, the Naples Depot allows guests to relive Florida's early railroading days with exhibits featuring a Seminole dugout canoe, antique swamp buggy, and restored railroad cars. Children delight at the miniature train rides and extensive model railroad layout. The Naples Depot is listed on the National Register of Historical Places.

Tours by Land and by Sea – See the best of Naples while onboard a vintage trolley cable car on the **Naples Trolley Tour**. Hop on and off at 21 stops on this narrated tour, which departs every hour from convenient locations around the Naples area. Those visitors wanting to stretch their sea legs may opt for a relaxing cruise or a dolphin

watch or shelling excursion aboard the lovely catamaran, **Sweet Liberty**. Another option is the **Naples Princess**, a luxurious yacht offering sightseeing, lunch, sunset hors d'oeuvres and sunset dinner cruises daily. **Cruise Naples** offers sightseeing cruises, fishing charters and JetSki rentals and tours from the docks at Tin City. **The Dolphin Explorer**, sailing from nearby Marco Island, welcomes passengers on board to serve as citizen scientists alongside naturalists studying the resident dolphin population for the 10,000 Island Dolphin Project. Special group charters are available from Port O' Call marina in Naples.

Posh Paintings & Performances – Truly a world-class facility with performances of the same caliber, the **Philharmonic Center for the Arts** hosts events every year, with everything from plays, to dance and art shows for Naples visitors and residents. Attached to the Philharmonic, the 30,000-square-foot **Naples Museum of Art** allows visitors to peruse 15 galleries, a glass dome conservatory, entrance gates by renowned metal artist Albert Paley and spectacular chandeliers and a Persian ceiling by acclaimed glass artist Dale Chihuly. The museum displays permanent collections as well as traveling exhibits. Located next door to The Inn on Fifth is the **Sugden Community Theatre**, home of the Naples Players, a 40-year-old community theater troupe. The gorgeous, multi-million dollar theater on Fifth Avenue features a main theater, studio theater, and outdoor stage. The **Gulfshore Playhouse**, located at the Norris Center in downtown Naples, offers visitors the first and finest professional theatre company in Naples. The Gulfshore Playhouse presents an array of entertaining productions, including important classics, Broadway hits and innovative new works. Located one block from The Inn on Fifth, the **von Liebig Art Center** showcases work from local, national and international artists and collections.

Side Trips

Marco Island & Everglades City – Explore the wilds of The Everglades and the rustic town of Everglades City 45 minutes east of Naples. Marco Island, 20 minutes from downtown Naples, is located at the southernmost tip of mainland Florida's west coast, is the largest inhabited isle of the "Ten Thousand Islands." At **Everglades Area**

Tours, Capt. Charles Wright sets guests up with the adventure of your choice, including kayak eco and fishing tours, kayak camping excursions, fishing charters, bicycle and aerial tours. Adventurous explorers can hop aboard **Speedy Johnson's Airboat Rides** to zip through mangrove jungles and grasslands. For a gentler experience, visitors can join captains Barry and Carol on their **Manatee Sightseeing Adventure** where guests will visit a manatee hideout and get up close and personal with the sea cows.

Immokalee/Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary – Spend the afternoon at the Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary, an 11,000-acre preserve that is the “crown jewel” of the National Audubon Society’s sanctuary system. Named as a Gateway Site for the southern section of the Great Florida Birding Trail, the sanctuary is home to hundreds of native and migratory bird species, alligators, bears, deer and more. A spectacular and rare ghost orchid has bloomed with multiple blossoms for the past three summers and is visible from the sanctuary’s boardwalk with the aid of a viewing scope or binoculars.

Lover's Key State Park – Fishing, biking, camping, canoeing and kayaking are all offered at Lover's Key, only 10 minutes north of Naples. The north side of the island features natural canals and tidal lagoons fringed with mangroves, which support an array of fish and diverse aquatic animals. Accessible by foot or boat, the park has modern bathhouses, picnic shelters, hiking trails and beautiful remote beaches. For those looking for a unique experience, the park offers adventure paddling day trips, including a visit to Mound Key to see Calusa Indian-built shell mounds, and overnight tours with experienced guides are available.

Paddling Trails - The Paradise Coast Blueway is Collier County’s system of paddling trails, providing GPS-marked routes through some of Southwest Florida’s most pristine estuarine environments. Phase One includes paddling trails in the Ten Thousand Islands region between Everglades City and Goodland on Marco Island. The Blueway system is identified using virtual trail routes marked by GPS coordinates. Phase One includes one

long route and six shorter day trip routes. Eventually the Paradise Coast Blueway will identify paddling trails throughout Collier County.

Fishing Excursions – Catch the “big one” on one of many fishing boat charters in the area. Specific tours explore the fertile waters of Rookery Bay and Ten Thousand Islands for snook, redfish, tarpon and other game fish species. Bass, crappie and blue gill can be found in fresh water at Lake Trafford, while the deep waters play home to grouper and snapper.

The concierge at The Inn on Fifth will be happy to find a fishing charter that meets your needs.

Experienced fishermen also have the option of renting a boat at one of the many area marinas and heading out into the fertile waters on their own. Of course, the historic, 1,000-foot-long Naples Pier is a perfect alternative for those wanting to stay on dry land. The City of Naples provides a blanket fishing license for the pier, so anyone can fish there whether they have a Florida fishing license or not.
